9:20 Mr. Brown called the meeting to order. Introductions.

Approve March **minutes** (vote) TB, AL, discussed paper grant, approve as written, unanimous

Craig Lovett, Capital Paper Recycling: “Secret Sauce” for office recycling. In 1989 began recycling white paper to paper and tissue; now service the most high rises in Boston of all companies; 100 employees make 31 tons of paper waste/year; CPR provides desk bins, help with education of all employees, pick up paper, bring to Weymouth facility, sort, bale, market. Most haulers bring to another recycler; they get paid well for paper. Give rebate if >5 TPM paper (don’t quote), \$20-40/ton. If company charged by ton for trash but no return for recycling, is disincentive for haulers to recycle; 35% average recycling rate for their clients, average is 20%; 40% is attainable in an office setting.

New clients – do audit, estimate equipment, bin needs, best practices, set goals; implement program; kickoff, educate property managers, staff, custodians; monitor, report.

Results in significant increase in recycling, 36% reduction in trash cost on average; post constant feedback, challenge is getting buy in from all involved (managers, employees, custodial staff)

Offer off site shredding; different collection process, do for big financial institutions;

Muni bldgs, schools? Definitely; do Boston schools (larger). Shredding at RTF? Hanover muni trash is about 200 TPW, can they handle? Yes, want more transfer station relationships; no curbside. Have compactors, monthly rental for bins and equipment; tailor programs to clients; Abitibi comparison? They are more passive. Have sister trucking company.
